

Story time sessions at St. John Neumann’s School and Head Start will be scheduled soon!

Crochet along with Kasey is beginning a new project!! Crocheted Pumpkins are easier than they look. Supplies: Any worsted or chunky weight yarn - (if worsted yarn Kasey recommends an H/5mm hook; If chunky yarn, Kasey recommends a K/6.5mm hook). One ball or skein should be plenty for the project. Also needed are stitch markers, scissors, Polyfil stuffing, and a yarn needle. Dates for October are October 12 and October 26 (Tuesdays) at 6:30 PM at the library.

The Bibliomaniacs Book Club will be discussing **“March”** by **Geraldine Brooks** on **Wednesday, November 3, at 4:45 PM.** Everyone knows Amy, Jo, Beth and Meg from “Little Women” – but little is known about their father who is off serving as a chaplain in the Civil War. This fictionalized account of Mr. March’s life: his abolitionist views, the horrors he sees in war, and the challenges to his beliefs. Louisa May Alcott based this character on her own father, Bronson Alcott, and Geraldine Brooks remains true to that vision in her character development. This book also received the Pulitzer Prize. 

hours).


