The **Prime Timers** event for January is **"Senior Cats for Senior Laps"**. It will be held at **St. Peter's Apartments on Wednesday, January 12, at 11 AM** and presenter is Tammy Jalbert, of the Columbia Animal Shelter. I personally can attest to the joys of cat ownership – but there are many things to think



about before making that decision. Tammy will explain in detail the responsibilities of owning a cat – and she will also talk about some of the kitties at the Shelter who are still waiting for their forever homes! The event is held at St. Peter's, but it is open to all in the community.

The **Bibliomaniacs'** title for the month of January is **"The Warmth of Other Suns: the Story of America's Great Migration"** by Isabel Wilkerson. One of the great untold stories of American history is the decades-long migration of black citizens who fled the South between 1915 and 1970 to northern and western cities, in search of a better life. Wilkerson interviewed over 1,000 people as part of her research. She describes the treacherous and exhausting cross-country trips by car and train, new lives in colonies of fellow blacks, and the unique food, faith, and culture these black citizens brought to cities such as New York and Chicago. The group will discuss this fascinating book on **Tuesday, January 25, at 3 PM** here at the library.





Tying right in with "The Warmth of Other Suns", the **Classics Club** is tackling both a challenging AND controversial book for January: "**Uncle Tom's Cabin".** Many have heard things <u>about</u> this book but few have actually read it! Some facts:

- Harriet Beecher Stowe was a confirmed abolitionist. She wrote this novel to tell the world what slavery was truly like.
- Book sales skyrocketed after the release and the book contributed to the opening of the Civil War.
- Despite being "anti-slavery", many Northerners of this time still carried prejudice perhaps more so than parts of the South.

This book is especially timely in the midst of the deconstruction of racism that is currently happening in our nation. Come find out for yourself! You may not agree with all characters and their decisions, but it is certainly some good food for thought and discussion. Wednesday, January 12, at 6 PM.

After 600 minutes of reading are completed (20 days for 30 minutes per day, 30 days for 20 minutes per day) the log is returned to the library and you will receive a voucher for a free kids' ticket. Tuesday, January 11, at 10:30 AM will be for ages 5-10. The program will either be "Robotic Pets" **OR** "Pokemon Habitats".

**Robotic Pets** involves building simple animal models that teach the basics of robotics and coding You will learn about sensors, gears, wheels, and axles while building a robotic dog, alligator, fish, or frog.





"Pokemon Habitats". All wild creatures, including

Pokemon, need a safe place to live. Design a habitat for your Pokemon – will it be a woodland forest? A desert? A northern tundra? Discover the biomes of our earth while having fun!

Tuesday, January 25, at 10:30 AM will be for ages 7-14. The program will be either "The Floating Boat Build" **OR** "Star Wars Astronomy".

The **Floating Boat Build** stimulates creativity by building a boat from LEGO bricks that actually floats! We will also learn how surface tension of the water affects buoyancy for your boat. Anchors aweigh!





**"Star Wars Astronomy"** involves building a Mars rover that can be controlled by writing simple code on the provided tablet. A Bluetooth hub is attached to each child's model that syncs to the tablet.

As you can see, the latter two programs are definitely for ages 7 and older. Children six and younger are invited to the Children's room upstairs for Storytime with Miss Lisa on Tuesday, January 25, at 10:30 AM.
