July begins with the library being closed, of course, on July 4th – Independence Day. But we hit the ground running on July 5th!



The Bibliomaniacs will be meeting on **Tuesday**, **July 5**, **at 2:30 PM**. They have decided on "The Personal Librarian" by Marie Benedict as their next title. This book has been lauded by the *New York Times*, the *Washington Post*, *Good Morning America*, and National Public Radio.

In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection for his Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and in art and literary circles, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating as she builds a

world-class collection.

But Belle has a secret that must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion

Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a wellknown advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American.

The Personal Librarian tells the story of an extraordinary woman, famous for both her intellect and style, and shares the lengths she must go to preserve her carefully crafted white identity in the racist world in which she lives.

Sir Percy Blakeney leads a double life: he seems nothing more than a wealthy playboy, but in reality he is a formidable swordsman and a quick-thinking escape artist. During the Reign of Terror in revolutionary France, he assists many French aristocrats in escaping the guillotine. The band of gentlemen who assist him are the only ones who know of his

secret identity. He is known only by his symbol: a simple flower called the scarlet pimpernel. The novel began its life in 1903 as a stage play by a French baroness. It later evolved into a novel and several film adaptations were made.

Thursday, July 14, at 10 AM at Park School Gym: "**Pirates!** Lost at Sea!" / Read Aloud to Jager. Ahoy! Set sail with us on a thrilling action-packed adventure about a crew of quirky pirates marooned on a desert island. Tuesday, July 19, at 6 PM at the Gazebo – Evening Family Program - "**Ryan Bridge the Bugman**". The bugs are back! Even though an insect's respiratory system does not allow it to survive in saltwater (without being eaten by a fish!), there are plenty of aquatic insects that love FRESH water. Come out and meet them! There will be opportunity to hold live insects for those who choose to. All ages.





Wednesday, July 27, at 6 PM at the Gazebo– Evening Family Program - "Jesse Rothacker's **Reptile Explorers**". Laugh and learn with Jesse Rothacker and his merry band of castaway critters. You'll meet snakes, lizards, turtles, and crocs from around the world, and they'll all be

Friday, July 29 at 10 AM at the Gazebo - "I've Got Rhythm" with Tammi Hessen. Do you have rhythms in your hands? In your feet? In your heart? We believe that there are rhythms to express, join in, and play together inside us and all around us. Come join us to explore your rhythm as we take a trip to West Africa to a village where rhythms are part of everyday living! Please Join Tammi and Jami as we lead you through the how-to of drumming, and the how-to of fun! Drums and fun props provided, you just bring your smiles, hands, and hearts.

Summer Reading 2022 once again features a **Scavenger Hunt.** Look in the windows of Columbia businesses for pictures of sea creatures. When you find one, write down the business name on your Scavenger Hunt paper. Those who finish the hunt get a free book, courtesy of Scholastic! Scavenger Hunt Papers, as well as paper reading logs, may be picked up at our circulation desk.

There are two formats to the logs – Paper (we will have some on hand for each age group) and "Beanstack" which is a mobile phone/tablet app. We will supply instructions for installing and using Beanstack.

Age groups for Summer reading include: Birth to age 4 – "Read Aloud" Ages 5 through 9 – "Junior" Ages 10 through 12: "Tween" Ages 13 through 19: "Teen"

Each age group has a different amount of minutes to read over the summer, as well as additional activities on their logs. Last day to complete your logs is August 13.

Keep Calm and Yarn On (our knitting and crocheting classes) will be meeting on **Tuesday**, **July 12 at 6:30 PM** (no July 26 meeting). Project for this month is the "Summer Daze Cardigan". Materials needed are Worsted or Sport weight cotton or cotton blend yarn. Recommended yarns are Lion Brand Comfy Cotton yarn (Joanne's or Walmart) or I Love This Cotton Yarn (Hobby Lobby) or Caron Cotton Cakes (Michaels). You will also need a size K(6.5mm) crochet hook, scissors, and a yarn needle. Yardage will depend on size of garmentthe average sized adult will need at least 1,500 yards.
